SPECIMES OF BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCHES FOR THE PROPOSED CATALOGUE.

John Glidden Brown was born in Quinnipeck, N. Y., May 2, 1800; parents, James and Elizabeth (Glidden) Brown, who moved to Epsom, N. Y., in 1806. He was prepared for College at Helderbergh High School, under the instruction of Rev. Moses Johnson, and entered Union College Jan. 1817. He studied law with Hon. Septimus H. Smith, of Great Falls; was admitted to the bar in 1821; and commenced the practice of law in Albany, with James S. Van Hoesen, Esq. In 1830 he moved to New-York City, which, thereafter, became his residence. He was Member of N. Y. Assembly 1832-5; State Senator 1836-8; Member of Congress 1839-41; and Judge of the Superior Court 1842-6. He died June 30, 1849, of cholera, aged 49 years. Besides occasional speeches, orations and opinions. he wrote a work on constitutional law, and edited the N. Y. State Papers. He received the Degree of L. L. D. from Hamilton College in 1846.

Joseph Henshaw Luther was born in Hanover, Mass., June 1, 1798; parents, Joseph and Madeline (Henshaw) Luther; prepared for College at Yorkville Academy, John Almy, Esq., Principal; and entered Union College Sept. 1814. He taught, 1818-20, in East Philadelphia, (Penn.) High School; graduated at Princeton Theological Seminary in 1823; and was ordained Sept. 25, 1823, at Marbletown, N. Y.; and was Pastor of the Presbyterian Church till 1825. He was Pastor of the 1st Congregational Church of Haselton, Conn., 1825-30; Professor of Rhetoric in Eric College 1831-40; retired on account of ill health, and now resides in Philadelphia, Pa. He has published six sermons on various occasions; a series of lectures on Rhetoric and Belles Lettres, and the "Communicant's Companion." He received the Degree of D. D. from the Hudson University in 1842.

Thomas Pennington Radway was born Feb. 23, 1778, in Benton, N. Y; parents, John Harmony and Mary (Pennington) Radway; was prepared for College at High Holme School, Rev. Hanover Kelton, Principal; entered Union College Sept. 1795; taught a few months in Suncook, Mass., in 1799; studied medicine with Dr. Jonas Physic and Dr. Abram Potecar, of Camermile; attended medical lectures at the College of Surgeons and Physicians, and was admitted to, and commenced the practice of medicine in La Rhine, in 1806. He was Surgeon in the Army 1813-15, and returned to practice at Oldbury in 1815, where he has since resided. He lectured in the Fairhaven Medical School on Anatomy and Physiology, 1830-5, and has published several articles in the New-York Medical Review, and two larger works on the "Functions of the Brain," and on "Gunshot Wounds."

Mr. Jedediah Burchard was then a resident of Sackets Harbor, and held lay services in the neighborhood and also at Adams, and Mr. Charles G. Finney, then prosecuting his studies for the ministry under Rev. Geo. W. Gale and Rev. George S. Boardman, D.D., a committee appointed by the Presbytery, actively engaged in the same schoolhouse labors. The first recognized appearance of the general revival was under the preaching of Rev. Thomas McAuley, D.D., then Professor in Union College, during the meeting of the Synod of Albany at Brownville. The open beginning of the revival at Watertown occurred a few months after the settlement of the Rev. George Smith Boardman there, and was continued under the labors of the then young pastor. Born in Albany 1796, graduated at Union College in 1816, and at Princeton Theological Seminary in 1819, and licensed by the Albany Presbytery the same year, Dr. Boardman spent the six months immediately following at Madison, Indiana, under a commission from the Gen. As. Board of Domestic Missions, and six months after, that, as stated supply at Westerlo, N. Y. Ordained by the Presbytery of St. Lawrence and installed as pastor at Watertown in 1821, he maintained the charge with faithfulness, ability and success for sixteen years, and left, under the constraint of duty alone, for a field promising greater usefulness as he supposed, and against the remonstrances of his people, and with the reluctant consent of the Presbytery, "after a full and tender discussion, in which the deepest regrets were unanimously expressed at his removal." Going to what is now the "Central Church," Rochester, N.Y. in 1837, and remaining there until 1842, he served the Second Church, Rome, as stated supply, from 1843 to 1847 and performing a brief pastorate at Cherry Valley, in 1850, he took charge of the church at Cazenovia and continued in it until 1865. Impaired health has since compelled him to decline the responsibilities of a pastorship, but his active labors have been unremitted, and while answering calls for single services in numerous places, he has performed them for several months continuously , at Rome, Ogdensburg and Little Falls, N. Y., and Chattanooga, Tenn., and for several weeks in the Island of Bermuda, and in Rome, Naples, Leghorn and Florence, Italy. pp.190-191

After the notice of Rev. George S. Boardman, D. D., on page 190, had passed through themprinter's hands, his death was announced, occurring at Cazenovia, February 7, 1877, in the eightieth year of his age, and preceded by only six days sickness, so slightly alarming, that at the time he was wearing his ordinary dress for the day. The career of one of the most useful laborers on this field thus closed, and that of one of its most excellent ministers. His whole life made the impression of godliness on all who were brought into intercourse with him, and though broken up in different settlements by prostrating bereavements, and

finally enfeebled by natural decay, he preserved a youthful appearance and spirit to the last, and kept up his activity. Not a great man, as measured by the ordinary standard of intellectuality, he was a great man, judged by the individuality and effectiveness of his methods of work. Independent in his opinions, tenacious of his modes of labor, and yet bold and enterprising enough to adopt the good in what was new, and as earnest in private interviews as in public performance, from his conversion to Christ to his translation by him, he was a continuous blessing to the congregations he served and the communities to which he belonged. Conscientiously and devotedly a Presbyterian, still more was he a Christian, and other denominations divided with his own the high respect and warm regard entertained for him, and when good men bore him to his burial, the whole town paused in its business, closed its shops, and put its homes in mourning. Among Dr. Eoardman's classmates at Princeton were Rev. Norris Bull, Drs. William Chester, John Goldsmith, Moses Hunter, William Nevins, William B. Sprague, Absalom Peters, Prof. Charles Hodge and Bishop John Johns. pp. 467-468

## GEORGE SMITH BOARDMAN

Was born in Albany, N. Y., December 29, 1796.
Married May 19, 1823, Alida Maria Lane, born April 4,
1802, daughter of Derick Lane, of Troy, N. Y. She died
at Watertown, N. Y., November 20, 1830.

He married for his second wife, Sarah Brayton, eldest daughter of George and Sarah (Swan) Brayton, of Westernville, Oneida Co., N. Y., February 28, 1832. She died July 18,1849. Dr. Boardman married for the third time, June 16, 1856,

Sophia Ledyard Childs, of Cazenovia, N. Y. He died February 7, 1877 at Cazenovia.

Dr. Boardman graduated at Union College in 1816, and at Princeton Theological Seminary in 1819. He became pastor of the church in Watertown, N. Y., in 1821, where he had a fruitful ministry of sixteen years. In 1837 he accepted a call to one of the churches in Rochester, and remained there for six years, except that for six months in 1842, he labored at Columbus, Ohio, in connection with a very marked revival of religion in that place. In 1843 her took charge of the church at Rome, N. Y., which he left in 1847 to enter upon a short pastorate at Cherry Valley, which he again left in 1850 to enter upon his longest and last, and perhaps most fruitful, pastorate in Cazenovia. The several changes of place which characterized the period of his life from 1837 to 1850, were occasioned by domestic hereavements, which for a time almost overcame him, and made change necessary. His pastorate in Cazenovia continued fourteen years, when impaired health required his release from the labors and responsibilities of a pastoral charge. In 1863 he went with his wife to Europe, being absebt about fourteen months, and returned with his health restored, and his strength recuperated by rest and travel. He thereafter eagerly and vigorously occupied himself in his chosen profession, either as an occasional, or stated supply, preaching for the last time on his 80th birthday in the church in Cazenovia, on the text, "Mine age is as nothing before Thee," a s ermon which was printed at the request of his former parishioners. One of his brother clergymen, who had long known him, wrote after his death. "His congregation at Cazenovia was one of the most intelligent in the State, and the best people among them appreciated him most highly, and derived great profit from his ministrations. He was very remarkable for his love of his work, and his enthusiasm in preaching. He never seemed to tire of active labor in his Master's service, and to the very close of his life of four score years, he delighted in the pulpit. He mingled in a rare degree the ripenessof age and the vivacity of youth, and was always at home in the social circle. Interested in all of the great movements of the day, devotedly attached to his own branch. of the church, yet with a true and catholic spirit, he was full of information about ecclesiastical and political affairs, and his conversation on these themes was always fresh and vigorous.

He retained his physical and mental faculties to the very last, and at the ripe age of 80 years, without the pains of a long and lingering sickness, he calmly and peacefully entered into rest, leaving behind him that memory of the just which is forever blest."
