

CLASS OF 1807

JOHN KIRBY

After an interval of nearly eight years, Rev. John Kirby was ordained pastor of the church, June 12, 1816 (Fourth Parish Church of Newbury, Mass).

Rev. Mr. Kirby sailed for Charleston, S. C., in 1818, for the benefit of his health. The vessel in which he took passage was wrecked on Ocracoke bar on the coast of North Carolina, and he was washed overboard and drowned, December 5, 1818.
