George W. Campbell died at his home in Pittsfield, Mass., on February 13th. He was a well-known woolen mamufacturer and an influential citizen.

GEORGE W. CAMPBELL

was born in Pittsfield, Mass. He was graduated in 1825, attaining the honor of the Phi Beta Kappa. Returning to Pittsfield he became in 1827 a corporator in the large Pontoosuc Woolen Mills and treasurer of the Company. He was a careful student of finance. In 1835 he became general agent of the company, but retired in 1841. From 1853 to 1861 he was president of the Agricultural Bank of Pittsfield, and retired from the directorship in 1863. He was a person of strong individuality; in politics he was an ardent Republican, and actively supported Horace Greeley in his presidental campaign. He gave liberally toward the erection of the First Congregational Church in Pittsfield and added \$4,000 toward the purchase of an organ. His private charities, especially to old fellow-townsmen in need, were not stinted. His health was never very good. He died at Pittsfield, Feb. 13th, 1880, in his 76th year, leaving a widow and two daughters.
