In regard to the attached clipping from the Schenectady Union Star, would advise that I have prepared this article on the Myers family in an endeavor to check the dates on the spoons 1776 and 1857. The first date 1776 was probably the date when Mary Van Schoon Hoven was born and it also might represent the date of the marriage of Michael Myers and Catharine Harter. I cannot find the date of their marriage but it was about 1776.

The second date 1857 does not mean the date of death of Mary Van Schoon Hoven as she died Feb. 5, 1838. It probably is the birth or marriage date of a later generation.

Perhaps L. F. Bellinger can check up on that 1857 date, he having come from Mohawk, N. Y. This Myers family was very prominent, Michael Myers the father was a general and judge while among his sons and son in laws was a county clerk, a county sheriff and three attorneys all serving at the same time.

Church record of Rev. John P. Spinner, died April 29, 1802 at Herkimer, N. Y. "Martin Peter (Mayer, died of old age, aged 87 years, 5 months and 25 days. Born the 4th day of Nov., 1714 in Michelfeld in the Kingdom of Wurtemberg, son of John Mayer a school master. He came to Philadelphia, Pa. in 1734, was married in 1739 at the age of 25. Begot 11 children of whom seven are living. His descendants increased to the number of 167 and now among those living, 137 in number. The piety learned from his example is still strong. In spite of poor health he lived to this age."

Note—The above "Martin Peter Mayer was probably known by the name Peter as all of his grandchildren who were named after him were called Peter Myers. His sons were John, Jacob, Joseph, Henrich, Michael, Matthew and Lawrence. The remaining four children to make the eleven were probably daughters.

Myers Family Compiled from Church Records

Michael Mayer (Myers) born Feb. 1, 1753, died Feb. 17, 1814, aged 61 years and 17 days, married Catharina Harter born Feb., 1758, daughter of Captain Henry Harter.

They had 12 children and Michael Myers lived to see 26 grandchildren of whom 5 died before him. Ten of their children are:

SILVER SET BOUGHT BY FORD

Amsterdam Teacher Receives \$1,200 From Auto Magnate for Heirlooms.

Schenectady Evening Star, March 20, 1930

Mohawk, March 20.—Miss Marion Myers Casey, an English teacher in the Amsterdam High School and a daughter of Mrs. Frederick Casey of this village, has just been paid \$1,200 for a three piece silver tea set and two silver spoons, purchased for the Ford museum at Dearborn, Mich. The tea set brought \$1,000 and the spoons \$200.

The silver was a wedding present to Mary Van Schoon Hoven when she became the wife of Peter Myers in 1799, who was a son of the Revolutionary general, Michael Myers, and Miss Casey is a direct descendant of Gen. Myers. Each generation has handed the heirlooms down to the eldest daughter at the time of her marriage. The spoons bear dates 1776 and 1857, it being believed that these were the years of the birth and death of the original owner. Records show that they were given to her by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jacobus Van Schoon Hoven.

From the the Peter Myers family the set was given to Eliza Myers when she was married to Maj. Fred Bellinger. Their eldest daughter, Mary Van Schoonhoven Bellinger, was married to the late Dr. James E. Casey of Mohawk, and again the set was presented as a wedding gift. Dr. and Mrs. James E. Casey had no daughter, the set was given to their eldest son, Dr. Frederick Bellinger Casey, who married Mary Eliza Bellinger.

Peter M. Myers, Juris Periti (attorney at law) of Herkimer, N. Y. and his wife Maria Van Schoonhoven were the parents of Elizabeth born July 23, 1803. Sponsors, Jacob Van Schoonhoven and wife Elizabeth, grandparents of the child born. They were residents of Waterford, Saratoga county, N. Y.

Died Feb. 5, 1838 at German Flatts, N. Y. Mary De Wolfe, born Schoonhoven, formerly wife and widow of Peter M. Myers, deceased. She died at her son in laws, Maj. Fred Bellinger, aged 61 years, buried side of her first husband, Peter M. Myers.

History of Free Masonry in New York state by Peter Ross, volume 1, page 173, a copy of which is on file in the library of the Masonic club of Schenectady, N. Y. It says Michael Myers, a Junior Warden Amicable Lodge was born at Elizabeth, N. J. Feb. 1, 1753. He came to Herkimer, N. Y. with a company of New Jersey soldiers and was seriously wounded in the Battle of Johnstown, N. Y. in 1781 where his brother Mathew was killed in the same battle.

Michael Myers married Catherine eldest daughter of Captain Henry Harter. She was born Feb., 1763. (This is an impossible date, should read born Feb., 1758) at Prescott, Canada where her parents were taken as prisoners during the French and Indian wars. This book by Mr. Ross names the children of Michael Myers as follows: Peter M., Henry, Nancy, Catherine, Mathew, Michael, John and Margaret born 1801 still living at Little Falls, N. Y. in 1888 at the age of 87.

Note—The above nine children were those who lived to be married and raised a family. There were 12 children born in all. There is an impression in my memory that Catharine Harter who later married Michael Myers, General and Judge, was born in a canoe while a captive. F. D. D.

Note—Mr. Vander Hoof did much work in bringing this line down to the present. Concerning the letters in the Enterprise on Henry Ford's Spoons, presented to the oldest son of Sergt. Michael Myers of Revolutionary war fame, ie. to Peter M. Myers, Attorney on his wedding, 1799 to Mary Van Schoonhoven, Mr. Vander Hoof writes when Peter Myers' daughters Eliza became second wife of Frederick C. Bellinger No. 34, she was presented with a silver tea set and two tea spoons, bought for \$1200 by Henry Ford. I have two of those table spoons with Nicholas Weaver's name on them and Ford cannot buy them. Which proves that a genealogical guess on the silversmith made by the writer, can be correct. See Enterprise of 30 April 1930. (Weaver's descendants live in Cleveland, O. (Baggs' Pioneers of Utica page 383).)

HENRY FORD'S SPOONS

MORE HISTORY OF THE FAMOUS MEYERS SILVER SET

Commander Bellinger Throws More Light on the Canoe Episode. Silver Set Probably Made by Nicholas N. Weaver.

Dear Editor:
Henry Ford's silver set bought from a daughter of my Cornell shipmate Fred Casey was attributed to the Revolutionary general Michael Myers. That is just too bad for "Henry!" The highest rank in the Revolutionary Militia held by Michael Myers is shown on the 1779 and 1780 pay rolls of his father in law, Capt. Henry Harter to be Sergt. Michael Myers then 26 or 27 years old. All of which goes to prove that my assertion should be taken seriously by the Lion Park Commissioners since I furnished and procured all the trophies in their Gun Park. My request of the commissioners was that the Gun Park which is not the ground itself but the atmosphere above the ground enveloping said guns, should be called the "Private Frederick Bellinger Gun Park." because said Frederick was "the only private in the Revolutionary war not promoted since his death." The commissioners couldn't see it a few years back but I feel willing to permit them to consider the matter. Mr. Deuel in your April 2 issue puts in a sort of challenge to me to check up on birth date from Catherine Harter, Capt. Henry's daughter and wife of Michael Meyers. This I can do because the family Bible of the Patentee Lorentz Herrther who died 1796 (see MacKenzie) and also the family record of Capt. Henry Harter as well as some of the Shoemaker families which are in the same Bible, is in my possession descending to me on the distaff side as shown in my late articles on the Sadler Bible family.

Michael Meyers' Probable Birth Place

Michael Myers' birth place is given in various histories as Annville, Am-bell and Elizabeth, N. J. I really think from the pronunciation of the first two that he was born in Am-boy, N. J. which is near Elizabeth, N. J. as quoted by Mr. Deuel, Ross' history reads as if Michael Meyers came with N. J. soldiers to fight in the valley at Johnstown in 1781, yet Michael was married on Oct. 25, 1777

Shoemaker had married Dorothea (Hess) as evolved for him by the late John B. Koetteritz. My Herrther family Bible had put a new light on some things and having in mind the big raid by the French in 1757, and having the birth date of Capt. Henry Harter's daughter Catharine as May 5, 1759 and the date of his marriage Oct. 10, 1758 I expressed a preference for believing a Bible date as against a family tradition. Since then I have learned that there were more raids than were written up in the school histories and also that family traditions are in the main correct, though facts and dates in them may be somewhat distorted, also thirdly, that Bible dates, church record names, and tombstone age figures are also sometimes in error. Mr. Shoemaker's reply was:

"You upset a family romance when you deny that canoe story. She was Catharine Harter, Henry's oldest daughter and my great grandmother. My grandmother has often told me that tale of her mother. I don't think she claimed her mother was born in the canoe, but her father, Capt. Henry Harter was told where to find the baby, in a canoe where its dress was frozen to the bark. I can not tell you the name of the Bellinger who married the father of General Michael Myers. I was in hopes you would know that. She was a second wife and raised a rumpus as second wives often do. Our records state that he married 'late in life' and in consequence his family was 'rent asunder.' He died Jan. 29, 1802 in Herkimer. We had great difficulty in locating the father of General Michael Myers in consequence of this marriage."

In this correspondence Mr. Shoemaker believed Michael Myers' father's name was Peter. When he placed the Myers history in "Colonial Families of the United States" by MacKenzie, Vol. 1, page 474 the general's father was named Johannis. This gives Peter Meyers, Tory, killed 1779. Michael's son Peter was born March 13, 1779.

Michael Myers Shoemaker had the "restless foot" as seen by his books of travel and his numerous journeys to Europe. He came honestly by it for his father was a civil engineer. You will be interested to know his politics, Mr. Editor, which are indicated by his membership in the Union Club of New York city.

One more Myers story is typed just as written to me by a dear old lady from Cattaraugus county, N. Y. That "Stamp Act" is not made much of in our school histories because of its lack of wisdom. But here is the local view of it:

Stamp Act Story

They tore it down, then drove him to his den. They destroyed every stamp they could find. They went to grandmother's, destroyed every stamp they found there. Myers never put up any more stamps.

That was the last time that grandfather ever had his sword buckled around him. My father was then ten years old. I have heard him tell what a great excitement there was at that time. Mr. Bellinger and Mr. Fox were from Ft. Herkimer. They were all military men. They did their duty in that case. Well, that law was repealed in a hurry after the people had revolted. Mr. Myers never became popular after that whilst he lived.

Col. William Clapsadie was grandfather's brother. I remember him well. Saw him often. Remember when he died. I was little, but still I remember. Colonel Rudolph Shoemaker was my father's brother-in-law. He married father's sister Margaret."

Nicholas N. Weaver Probabl Silversmith

That silver tea set and the spoons were quite probably made by Nicholas N. Weaver, a silversmith of Utica, N. Y. it was quite "the thing" in those days to have Weaver make things by hand, spoons and all and his handiwork was as well thought of in the valley as Tiffany's was 80 years later. I have one of his silver teaspoons now with my baby teeth marked in it which was in a set presented by Miss Weaver to my grandmother Elizabeth Fox. Weaver moved to Milwaukee as recounted in one of the histories of Utica about or before 1850. His daughter married an Ellis, and one of her daughters was Mrs. George T. McIntosh in the hardware business in Cleveland, O.

The esteem in which Weaver was held is shown in what is written in a marriage notice by Domini Spinner

"1843 Sept. 28 Lawrence Bellinger legitimate son of Frederick Bellinger and Elizabeth Shoemaker his betrothed wife has been married in the house of Fred Fox to Elizabeth Fox the legitimate daughter of George Fox Esq. and Elizabeth Hess his betrothed wife both deceased—a virgin female of the first order and conducted in the presence of many witnesses all and every one of German Flatts and especially of Miss Weber or Weaver of Utica the only one not brought up in German Flatts and Frederick Bellinger the brother of the bridegroom. \$5!"

All that notice for \$5!

By contrast observe this following notice of a Little Falls couple:

"Paid an undivided Spanish Silver Dollar! Who says Dimini Spinner wasn't caustic?"

The dates of marriages and of births of the parties most closely interested do not fit with the dates on the spoons as requested by Mr. Deuel. With his copies of records he can probably unscramble the Mayer mixup given below:

One Mayer was called "Felix" * by some and something else by others. As a second wife he took widow Abalona ((Appolonia) Bellinger and her will 1784-88 was contributed by me and printed in the Enterprise, a couple of years ago. (Mrs. Marjorie (Zoller) Smith of Fort Plain is a descendant of "Abalona" through Anna Kilts). Then comes in a Rosenkrantz, church record, in which "Anna Maria Majer, Peter Majer's wittibe" was a sponsor March 4, 1794 for

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Born in an Indian Canoe

Catherine Harter's birth date being given, her place of birth is of really great romantic interest. It is mentioned in Benton's and in Beers' Histories of Herkimer County. Some study of detail is here given that has never before been published. The south side of Mohawk river was ravaged in April, 1758; the north side in Nov. 1757.

Mr. M. M. Shoemaker, the author of books of travel and of research, such as Quaint Corners of Ancient Empires, The Heart of the Orient, Islands of the Southern Seas, Prisons and Palaces of Mary Queen of Scots, written 1899-1906, wrote those books with a very pleasant touch of humor all through them. With this humorous vein in mind, the following excerpts of letters written to me 25 years ago will be fully appreciated by the reader. He provided the material for MacKenzie's "Colonial Families of the United States," evidently after this correspondence with me in which I quoted a record of Domini Rosenkrantz which changed his idea of the name of General Michael Meyers' father, from "Peter" to "Johannis" Meyer. In May, 1906 Mr. Shoemaker writes:

"As to that canoe episode we do not claim that Henry Harter was carried captive, but his wife was and her daughter was born in that canoe. He went after them and had the devil's own time to find them. The baby was separated from its mother and when he found it, its clothes had frozen to the canoe. That baby lived until 1839 and told the tale many times to her grand daughter, Mrs. Bowen, my aunt who has often told me. My aunt Anna aged 75 is now here and when I told her you doubted the story, she rose up and desired to meet you. It's as well you were not here. She's gone to bed now and the servants are restoring the furniture."

Tradition vs. Bible Dates

In Jan., 1905 Mr. Shoemaker was certain that our ancestor Lt. Thomas

maker believed Michael Meyers' father's name was Peter. When he placed the Meyers history in "Colonial Families of the United States" by MacKenzie, Vol. 1, page 474 the general's father was named Johannis. This gives Peter Meyers, Tory, killed 1779. Michael's son Peter was born March 13, 1779.

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Stamp Act Story

"I wish to tell you of an incident that occurred before my grandfather died. My father was about ten years old. I tell this just as I often heard him tell it in his lifetime but are historical facts. If you have read the history of the U. S. in our schools years ago, do you remember reading of a law that was passed by our Congress, I think, in between 1798 and 1802. I forget the exact date, but no matter, it was passed. That law was called the "Alien and Sedition" law. The Stamp Act was passed at the same time. When that became known many people could not understand what it meant. When they did find out what that Stamp Act meant there was a time amongst them. There was a man in Herkimer appointed by the government to go from house to house, everywhere and tax or rather put the stamp onto everything he could find worth stamping.

He went to my grandmother's. (His name was Myers). My grandmother lived in a log cabin. Grandfather Piper had been dead two years. Myers put stamps on all she had. When he put stamps on her window glass panes she went for him. The windows were small and only three in all. I remember how they were. Well, my grandmother tore his stamps off, destroyed them as fast as he put them up. I had my mother tell of it. She was then ten years old and remembered well what a time there was. The people were terribly wrought up. They expected another war. So one morning when the people rose about their work, they saw a large sign board in front of Myers house with "stamp act" painted on it. That was too much for the people to bear. Then they bolted. Folks in German Flatts called a meeting. Grandfather Clapsadle, Colonel or General Belinger, Mr. Fox from Ft. Herkimer, Co. Shoemaker, Colonel Clapsadle, a great many others whose names I forget, put on their Regimentals, buckled on their swords. They all were soldiers. So in a body they marched to Herkimer. They told Myers to take that signboard down. He refused.

By contrast observe this following notice of a Little Falls couple:

"Paid an undivided Spanish Silver Dollar! Who says Dimini Spinner wasn't caustic?"

The dates of marriages and of births of the parties most closely interested do not fit with the dates on the spoons as requested by Mr. Deuel. With his copies of records he can probably unscramble the Mayer mixup given below:

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"To connect or to segregate! That is the question." My question is who was Abalona Mayer's first husband? Her son was Adam Bellinger, her son in law was Frederick Harter, older brother of Capt. Henry Harter.
