Damon, Howard Franklin. Ms., 1833-1884. A hospital physician of Boston. Leucocythæmia; Neurosis of the Skin; General Remarks on the Frequency of Skin Diseases. Lip.

Dana, Alexander Hamilton. E., 1807-1887. A lawyer of New York State. Ethical and Physiological Inquiries; Inductive Inquiries in Physiology; Ethics and Ethnology; Enigmas of Life, Death, and the Future State.

Dana, Charles Anderson. N. H., 1819-1897. A distinguished journalist of New York City. He was assistant secretary of war 1863-65, and since 1868 the editor of The New York Sun. His political writing is noted for its bitter partisanship, but the literary quality of his work is admirable. With J. G. Wilson, infra, he prepared a Life of General Grant, and was co-editor with George Ripley, infra, of the American Cyclopædia. The Household Book of Poetry was edited by him. Ap.

Dana, Charles Louis. Vt., 1852—
—. A physician of note as a neurologist, who has published a Text-Book on Nervous Diseases.

Dana, Edward Salisbury. Ct., 1849—. Son of J. D. Dana, infra, assistant professor of natural philosophy at Yale University since 1879, and curator of the mineral cabinet in the Peabody Museum there. Dana, James Dwight, Ph.D., LL.D., [ante, vol. i., add.,] has held since 1850 the Silliman professorship of natural history and geology at Yale College, the title of which was changed in 1864 to that of geology and

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was born in Oswego, N. Y., in 1807. He began his legal practice in New York City and at length became head of an important firm. In 1854, he was associated with Hon. Clarkson N. Potter. He was a very effective pleader and also wa author of several thoughtful works--"Enigmas of Life, Death and the Future State," "Ethical

and Physilogical Inquiries, " &c.

He died at Montclair, N. Y., April 27th, 1887, of peritonitis, leaving two sons and three daughters.

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Alexander H. Dana, died at Mountclair, N.J., April 27, 1887, Mr. Dana was born in Oswego, July 4, 1807, studied law in New York City and began practicing before he was 21. He was the head of the firm Dana, Woodruff & Leonard until 1854 when he took offices with Clærkson N. Potter. Mr. Dana wrote the law articles for the first edition of Appleton's New American Encyclopedia and was the author of "Enigmas of Life, Death and the Future State" and "Ethical and Physiological Inquiries."
