You might write to the First Presbyterien Church, Union St., which has a very old cemetery on its grounds. They might be able to tell you the dates, if Dr. or Mrs. Rowan are buried there. We tried to telephone there; but as they have no pastor at present, no one answered. There is also The State Street Presbyterian Church in Schenectady.

The college has treasurer's books back as far as 1806; but this date, of course, is not quite early enough for your question.



My Dear Mr. Waldron:

Your letter of May 26th was received, with the biographical record chart of David Spraker, Sr.enclosed.

I have filled this out as completely as possible. It is fortunate that my husband has all the papers of both his father, David Spraker Jr. and his grandfather David Spraker Sr., including their diplomas from Union College. An old scrap-book contains clippings and papers concerning the careers of both these men; also obituaries of Stephen N. Rowan.

Among other things in the scrap-book is an old program of the graduating exercises of the Class of 1822. If you have no copy of this and would care for a copy of this one, we would be glad to have a photostat made.

We have also a paper bound book "The First Semi-Centennial Anniversary of Union College, Gelebrated July 22, 1845" published by W. C. Little and Co., Albany.

Regarding the Rowan family, I have since hearing from you, communicated with the First Presbyterian Church of Schenectady. The church secretary has located the graves of both Rev. Stephen N. Rowan and his wife, Margaret (Beekman) Rowan. She died January 3, 1850, aged 63.

We have also heard from Mr. F. W. Spraker of (804) Cooperstown, N.Y. (son of David Spraker Sr.) that he has the old Rowan family Bible in his possession, giving the following record of Stephen N. Rowan's wife:

At the early age of six he had received deep impressions of religion, having been nurtured in truth by the kind and faithful instructions of a pious mother. At Greenwich his zealous and faithful labors were abundantly blessed, but at length an unbappy difference caused him to leave that church, and to found the Eighth Presbyterian Church in Christopher Street, in which many of his personal friends and converts of his ministry united. Here great success also attended his labors. For many years he was the efficient secretary for the society whose object was to ameliorate the condition of the Jews, visiting Europe in this behalf.

He was universally recognized in the community as a man of perspicuous, commanding intellect. His mind was characterized by clearness, directness, definiteness, and sound common sense. He went directly to his object, and whatever his hearers may have thought of his public exhibitions, none could doubt the meaning of his remarks, and few could avoid their point. His style of composition was remarkably chaste and accurate, adorned at times by the happiest illustrations, drawn from his extensive reading. As a friend he was most affectionate and faithful, and while to the world that had often cruelly oppressed him he might sometimes appear to cover his heart under an iron mask, yet, to trusted friends, he was warm-hearted, confiding, and tender. It pleased God to try him sorely in various ways, yet he did not weep over his own trials; but he would shed tears of sympathy with others in their misfortunes. He commended himself highly while in Europe to the friends of truth, who spoke of him in terms of warm approbation.

I am trying to trace the ancestry of my husband's great-grandfather, Rev. Stephen Rowan of Schenectedy. We have just discovered in some old papers the statement that Rev. Rowan was a graduate of Union College in 1805.

Would your records of the students of that early date show the names of the parents and the residence of student and parents at the time of enrollment? If so, would you kindly send me a copy of such data concerning Stephen Rowan of the Class of 1805?

We will be glad to pay charges of the work of searching for and copying the record.

Stephen Rowan was born in Salem, Washington County, New York in 1787, and is said to have been the son of James Rowan, but we have not been able to find the name of James' wife, nor when or where either of them died.

Stephen Rowan was the minister of a Presbyterian Church in Schnectady, and died there in 1835. If there is more than one Presbyterian

Your letter of the 13th was received, and Mr. Spraker is pleased to send you herewith the following:

> 1. A Catalogue of Officers and Students of Union College, June, 1822;

2. A Catalogue of Officers and Students and Register of Societies, Union College, 1867-8;

3. The Songs of Union, 1865; 4. Typewritten copy of "Order of Commencement in Union College". July 24, 1822.

This last is pasted in the family scrap-book and would be very difficult to remove.

This family scrap-book, which was started by David Spraker, Sr. (Class of 1822, Union) also contains numerous programs, invitations, etc. pertaining to Union College of that period, including an invitation to the Commencement Ball, July 24, 1822 and bills for student's expenses, 1822. For the 1865-69 period there are several term reports enumerating fees and student expenses and the student's attainments and merits; an "Order of Commencement Exercises, "July 24, 1867, and one for July 1, 1868; a program of "Prize Oratory" July 23, 1867 and one of "Prize Speakers" dated June 30, 1868.

Mr. Spraker's father, Bavid Spraker, Jr. delivered the Latin Salutatory in the 1868 program.

You are correct in assuming that my husband, James R. Spraker, is a descendant of a graduate of Union College, in fact of three early graduates.

1. His father, David Spraker Jr., Canajoharie, N.Y. Class of 1868. 2. His grandfather, David Spraker, Sr.

3. His great-grandfather Stephen N. Rowan, Salem, N.Y. 1804. (The latter was father-in-law of David Spraker, Sr.) All of these men were members of the Phi Beta Kappa Society.

In 1937 I had some correspondence with you regarding the above Stephen N. Rowan, D.D. You kindly sent us some data from the Union College Alumni Record, and we sent you some biographical data of Stephen N. Rowan and his son-in-law, David Spraker, Jr. (Class of 1822). I think you will find these in your files.

Our letters you will find under dates of May and June, 1937. I intended to send you a copy of the 1822 commencement program at that time, but neglected to do so, and our correspondence was so carefully filed away with family records that I did not refer to it again when I wrote you on January 3 of this year.

In your letter of May 22, 1937 you said you had clippings from a Salem, N.Y. and a Troy paper on the death of Rev. Stephen N. Rowan. We would greatly appreciate having typed copies of these.
