WILLIAM THOMPSON, Class of 1806

From pamphlet published by Seneca Falls Historical Historical Society:

"Hon. Wm. Thompson was born in Stillwater, Saratoga Co., N. Y. March 4, 1785. He graduated at Union College, in 1806. After completing his college studies he entered the office of his brother James*who was practising law in Milton, Saratoga Co., N. Y.

"In the spring of 1812 he found his new home and pitched his tent in the town of Ovid, in this county (Seneca). It is said of him, 'not greedy of gain he did not use his influence as a lawyer in the promotion of strife, but often counceled amicable settlements of difficulties between contending parties.'

"Though not seeking preferment, he was more than once called to represent his county in the Legislative Halls of this state, and, by his acknowledged ability and popularity, succeeded to the Speaker's Chair. He died November, 18, 1871."
