## REV. HARMEN VEDDER 1790

The ministerial services next enjoyed by this church were those of the Rev. Harmen Vedder, who is expected this day to lay the corner stone of our new edifice, being the oldest living minister who has regularly served this congregation. He labored here in connection with his other charges, from seven to eight years, till about 1814.

### HARMAN VEDDER

The first name or title of this church (Reformed Protestant Dutch Church in Gallatin, Columbia Co., N. Y.) was that of "Stissick" (probably "Stissing," from the mountain at the South), the second that of "Ancram," before the town was divided in 1830; and for many years, in its old age, it has borne the fresh and verdant name of the "Greenbush Church." It is popularly known as the "Vedder" church, after its longtime pastor, Rev. H. Vedder.

Rev. Harman Vedder serived as past or from 1803 until 1864. He was a graduate of Union College, in the Class of 1799, and died in the parsonage of this church in 1873.

He was born in Botterdam, Schenectady Co. New York Nov. 17, 1777

Studied under Rev. Dr. Dirck Romeyn and Solomon Froeligh, D.D.

Graduated from New Brunswick Theological Seminary, Class of 1801

Licensed by the Classis of Albany, N.Y. Reformed Dutch Church in 1801

He was pastor at the Reformed Churches of Greenbush, N.Y. and Taghkanic (1903, 1850). Also supplied Dinlithgo, N.Y. during 1806-1814. Greenbush was later called Gallatin. He moved to the Gallatin Church parsenage Dec. 25, 1803 and lived his entire life there, his death occurring on June 29, 1873. He was the active pastor of the Gallatin Church for Sixty Years.

# Hermanus Vedder, Class of 1799

There were two members of the Class of 1779, both ministers, who made great records, both in longevity and in pastoral service. Rev. Henry Ostrander who graduated at 18, lived to be ninety-one and had a pastorate at Katsbaan, near Saugerties, of fifty years. But Rev. Hermanus Vedder of this class, who received his degree when he was twenty-one, lived to the age of ninety-six years and had a pastorate in the Livingston Manor church, in Columbia county of sixty-one years.

Herman Vedder was born in Rotterdam, N.Y. and after leaving college he studied theology under Dr. Dirck Romeyn, at the time pastor of the Dutch church in Schenectady and Prof. Solomon Froeligh of the Dutch church. His great-grandfather had come from Holland and settled in the valley of the Mohawk with the Yates, Van Vrankens, Sanders, Schermerhorns, and others noted in church and state.

The church which he served so long and faithfully is to this day popularly known as the "Vedder" church. In the beginning of his ministry his field of a bor embraced almost two hundred square miles. He lived and labored up to the time of his decease in full possession of all his physical and mental abilities. In the old burying ground around the "Vedder" church, where the legible tombstones date back to 1770, is an imposing monument to the memory of this servant of God, the inscription on which tells of his long life and of his pastorate in that church of sixty-one years.

Vedder, Hermanus, b. at Rotterdam, N.Y., Nov. 17, 1777; U.C. 1799, studied under D. Romeyn and S. Froeligh, lic. Cl. Albany, Sept. 29, 1801; Greenbush and Taghkanic, 1803-50, also supplied Linlithgo, 1806-14, Greenbush, (Gallatin,) 1850-64; died, 1873, June 29.

His great-grandfather (paternal side) came from Holland, and settled on the Mohawk, in company with the Yates, Van Vrankens, Sanders, Schermerhorns, and others, known both in Church and State. He resigned his pastorate only when he had reached the age of eighty-nine, and died at ninety-six. For many years he had been the senior minister in the Reformed Church. A fellow-student, Henry Ostrander, reached the age of ninety-one. It is difficult to appreciate the scope of so long a life unless we compare it with historical events in Church and State. He could remember the close of the Revolutionary War, being then six years old, and he was fifteen when the first American Constitution of the Reformed Dutch Church was written. He was in the ministry for seventy-two years.

His character was marked in an unusual degree by a constant and impressive goodness. Calm in temperament, kind in heart, exemplary in piety, courtly in manner, faithful in every good word and work, he preached the gospel, not only with his lips, but also beautifully with his life. This secured to him so long the affection of successive generations of parishioners, until those whom he had baptized in their infancy had become the grayheaded worshipers who bowed before him as their pastor still.

# HERMAN VEDDER

Married Ariantje Van Vranken, born May 9, 1779. He was a graduate of Union College in 1799 Licensed as a minister of the Reformed Church

Died in Gallatin, Columbia County, June 29, 1873, aged 96 years, the oldest pastor of that denomination, full of pious labors, and through life greatly beloved. He had been in the active ministry 62 years.

# Old Diploma 2 % 1944 To Be Shown

Antiques Displayed in Consistory Room of First Reformed Church

A diploma of the class of 1799 of Union College, the third class to be graduated from the college, to Her-Union College, the third class to be graduated from the college, to Herman Mynderse, grandfather of the late Dr. Herman W. Mynderse, together with the little hair trunk which Herman took to Union College with him, will be loaned by Mrs. Herman V. Mynderse to the exhibit of antiques being held today and tomorrow in the consistory room of the First Reformed Church. The diploma is signed by Eliphalet Potter, first president of Union College. The exhibition has been arranged by group three of the woman's society, of which Mrs. Clayton Johnson Potter and Mrs. John Weber are leaders. Miss May Hanbridge Moon is chalirman in charge of the exhibition.

There will be old furniture, silver, china, documents and many other things which are of particular interest as they are mostly connected with the history of the city and its families.

A silver church service, dated 1800, will be shown. This consists of a wine tankard and baptismal bowl used by Rev. Andrew Oliver of Springfield, Mass. About 20 Windsor chairs will be included, and will show the various types of this chair. There will be several interesting antique costumes and several of those in charge of the exhibition and tea will dress in ancestresses clothes.

at the age of ninety-five.

Also supplied Linlithgo, N. Y., 1806-14. Greenbush (Gallatin, N. Y.), 1850-64. Died at Gallatin, N. Y., June 29, 1873.

Vedder, Hermanus, b. at Rotterdam, N.Y., Nov. 17, 1777; U.C. 1709, studied under D. Romeyn and S. Froeligh, lic. Cl. Albany, Sept. 20, 1801; Greenbush and Taghkanic, 1803-47, also supplied Linlithgo, 1806-14, Greenbush (Gallatin), 50-64; died, 1873, June 29. His ministry of 72 years was contemporaneous with the rise and progress of the America Republic. He remembered the Revolutionary war and was keenly interested in the Civil War. For many years he was the wise spiritual adviser in a territory which is now occupied by ten churches.

The Reformed Church Classis of Hudson met Sept. 22 in the Gallatin Dutch Church where the Rev. HERMAN VED-DER was pastor for 63 years. Dr. Vedder's name is on the Memorial Chapel pulpit along with that of Dr. B. A. Mynderse, Union 1849, and Dr. H. V MYNDERSE, Union 1884. -W.N.P.D.
