JUSTUS M. CLARK

Son of Jesse A. (who came from Fort Covington, N. Y. in 1832) took the farm occupied by his father in 1835. He married Martha Dunn; he had kept school in Kentucky; he was a Presbyterian minister, and died on his farm February 13, 1867, leaving children. One daughter married Walter Good, now of Marseilles; one married Henry Howland; Julius Clark is a lawyer, now in Kansas.
