## JACOB HASBROUCK

Was born April 2, 1800, in the town of Marbletown, N. Y., in the county of Ulster, N. Y. He completed his academic course at Kingston, Ulster Co.,; entered Union College in 1815, and graduated at the same place in 1819. He commenced the study of medicine in the office and underthe instruction of Dr. Henry Hornbeck, of Walkill, Ulster Co., and graduated at the College of Physicians and Surgeons, New York City, in the year 1822. Commenced the practice of medicine in the town of Rochester, Ulster Co., N. Y., where he remained three years; moved to the town of Marbletown, in the same county, and was in active practice for seventeen years. He then moved to Seneca county, located at Tyre, and continued in the practice of his profession for six or seven years, after which he relinquished the practice of medicine and devoted his time to agriculture. He died December 26, 1862.

## JACOB HASBROUCK

Was born in the town of Marbleton, Ulster Co., N. Y., April 2, 1900/ His parents were Jospeh and Margaret Hasbrouck.

The subject of this sketch remained on his father's farm until he was eleven years old. During this time he availed himself of the benefits of the district school and private instruction, and at an early age he entered Kingston Academy where he completed his academic course in 1815. Soon after leaving Kingston Academy he entered Union College, and after four years' studentship graduated in the year 1819.

He then entered the office of Dr. Henry Hornbeck of Walkill in Ulster Co., where he pursued his medical studies for three years. He attended three courses of lectures at the College of Physicians and Surgeons of New York City, and graduated in the years 1832.

At first Dr. Hasbrouck located in the town of Rochester, Ulster Co., N. Y., where he pursued the practice of his profession for three years. He removed thence to Marbletown, the place of his birth, where he continued in active practice for seventeen years. He then sold his farm, and came to the town of Tyre, Seneca Co., and here continued his professional work for six or seven years, when he relinquished the practice of medicine anddevoted the remainder of his life to farming.

In the year 1825 he married Arietta Schoonmaker, and was the father of ten children-three sons and seven daughters, of whom one son and two daughters are still; iving, namely, William Hasbrouck, of Tyre, Christina Hasbrouck, of the same place, and another daughter, Sarah, who is married and resides at Newburgh, N. Y.

Dr. Hasbrouck died December 26, 1862, from cerebral shock, the result of being thrown from his carriage.
