I was up at White Creek where Dr. Joseph W. Reichards is buried. He died in White Creek. He was born November 4, 1800 and died September 3, 1886. Dr. Joseph's father, William, was also a doctor and came from Watertown, Conn. He was a Revolutionary War descendant.

He first practiced in Troy, that is, Joseph W. and then moved to 12 Clinton Place, New York City where he was in the firm of Green, Douglas and Reichards. Douglas was General Grant's physician and Reichards doctored Peter Cooper. Joseph's sister was "sparked" by Amos Eaton. The story goes that the sister was a very strong Quaker and that Amos liked his bottle, hence no soap.

I don't know where I got that Duanesburg Medical College story but I'll try and locate it, as I know a woman who is a cousin or something of the doctor's.
