JOHN SANDERS

Hon. John Sanders was born in Glenville, N. Y., in 1802. His father was Presiding Judge of Albany Court when Schenectady County was a part of it. He graduated from Union College in 1822, and completed his legal studies in 1825, and practiced for a year in Albany, and afterward in Northampton, Catskill and Clermont, New York. In 1836 he settled in Schenectady, and in 1840 was appointed by Governor Seward Surrogate, which office he held till 1844. He was County Judge from 1855 till 1860. He was identified with the interests of the Bar in various localities of the State, and is the author of a history of the County of Schenectady.
