Union College 30th March 1832

Dear Sir:

Your son has good talents and in my judgment has been very much improved since he came to this institution - and I doubt not he will answer your hopes for the future. Still he is constitutionally gay - and during the last term he went once to Albany and once to a supper in Schenectady at a tavern - contrary to our rules and for which his conduct on his bill will be somewhat reduced. Now in the view of what has taken place - and in the view of the increased temptations of the last senior term, I have been led to think that it will be better for him to enter a law office at once and of course remain away from College the next ----- I might not have so thought if my own health were good, but it is not and I fear I shall not be able to be present during a great part of the next term and under this impression I do believe your son will be safer at home than at College. Excuse this - written with difficulty and believe me

CORNELIUS L. RUSSELL, '32, was born in Salem, N. Y., September 9, 1808. Was a Philomathean and a Kappa Alpha. Studied law in Whitehall, N. Y., several years; in '35 settled in Cleveland, O., in the law and real estate business, and later engaged in lake transportation, owning several large vessels; also dealing largely in lumber and lime. From 1880 till his death his eyesight was quite gone, but he bore the great privation with patience, and even cheerfulness. Was an active Odd Fellow and first grand chancellor of the Knights of Pythias in Ohio. Was an earnest republican, twice elected councilman of Cleveland. Was an active Episcopalian and member of the vestry. Although beyond the term of service, he enlisted on Lincoln's special call for troops for one hundred days, at the opening of the war. He died from old age and a fall, at Cleveland, March 30, 1896, leaving a widow and a married daughter.

The accounts of Mr. C. L. Russell, Ex-Collector at Cleveland, Ohio.--We learn that since that person has been indicted under the Treasury law for defalcation, he has paid into the Treasury through the District Attorney for Ohio, \$25,000, and has secured \$50,000 more subsequently, so that it cannot fail to be eventually recovered. It is not yet known what is the precise balance due from Russell, this being one of the "False entry" cases alluded in the report of the Secretary of the Treasury. (Washington Star, Dec. 7)

...."last week, Gen Cass the greate champion of the democracy passed through this place on his way (as he said) to his house, having finished his publick career. By previous arrangement the cars arrived some time earlier than usual, but alas it was an unhappy arangement, for as he stepped from the car with high expectations (no doubt) of meeting crowds of his friends, the unwelcome sound met his ear of three cheers for Taylor and Fillmore. At this crisis of affairs Judge Jones arrived and escorted him to Givens Hotel where he took by the hand such of his friends as desired the honor, and after taking a 'flowing bowl' of brandy and watter, he again came forth and made an attempt at a speech but utterly failed, and again as he was entering the cars three cheers were called for and given respectively for Henry Clay, Gen. Taylor, Fillmor, the Willmot Proviso, the Barn Burners, and John Van Buren. From these demonstrations Gen. Cass will hardly know how to number his friends in Schenectady...."
