Canajoharie **Church Observes** Centennial Days

(Continued from last week)

Other ministers through the years came to the Canajoharie church, follow: Dr. Wells, Rev. Richard D. Van Kleeck, a Union College graduate of 1822, Rev. Samuel Robertson, a nafive of Those (1822, 1829). of Troy (1836-1839,) (1842-1845,) ward Osborne Dunning later a chaplain in the Civil War; the Rev. James MacFarlane (1845-1848). John DeWitt, another Union College man, came to the ministry here in 1848, remaining but a couple of man, came to the ministry here in 1848, remaining but a couple of years. In 1850 he began a thirty years professorship at the New Brunswick, N. J. Seminary. He was followed by Nathan F. Chapman (1849-1854.) Next followed a pulpit supply of three years (1854-1856) by Rey Ehen S. Hammond and a second Rev. Eben S. Hammond and a second supply of two years by Rev. Alonzo Welton who was called but declined the same. In 1856 a U. S. dime was officially declared the seal of the church, but for what reason we do not know. Rev. Dr. Benjamin Romaine who had been editor of the Albany,, N. Y. "American Spectator" for fifteen years began to supply the pul-pit in 1857 but, later, was installed pit in 1857 but, later, was and remained as pastor for five years (1757-1862.) During the Romaine pastorate the church was thoroughly pastorate the church was thoroughly renovated, the galleries removed, the pulpit changed from the south end to the north and the pews reversed. A cloth covered the pulpit, gift of the North Dutch Church of Albany, which had been given the Albany which had been given the Albany church by the family of the first pa-troon of Albany, Kiliaen Van Rensse-Rev. Benjamian Van Zandt, a third Union College man to be pastor here, came in 1862 and remained through 1869. He was a strong abowhich attitude brought him litionist, much discomfort.

Rev. Richard R. Williams, who was of Waterford, Ireland, came from the Seminary (Union) of New York City in 1870 and had a long pastorate here (1870-1883.) Later and until his death in 1915, he was the owner and editor of "The Iron Age," a noted industrial journal. The pulpit was death in 1915, he was the owner and editor of "The Iron Age," a noted industrial journal. The pulpit was next supplied for about a year by the Rev. John A. Lansing (Union College class of 1842.) A longer than usual pastorate now comes, that of Rev Francis Stoddard Haines, nearly eight years, during which he added two hundred and sixty-one members to the church roll. The next pastor was the Rev. Mark Austin Denman (1891-1897,) to be followed by the Rev. Joseph D. Peters (1897-1910) who passed away a few years ago at Hempstead, L. I. Rev. George Davis came in 1911, spent three years here and died suddenly while pastor. During his pastorate the parsonage was erected. Rev. Victor J. Blekking was called to the pastorate in Octoing his pastorate the parsonage was erected. Rev. Victor J. Blekking was called to the pastorate in October, 1914 and remained here until 1922, since which time he has served the Cohoes Reformed church. The Rev. Edward R. He entered Union College from Poughkeepsie, in May, 1819; re-entered in Sept. 1819 (in sephemore class), and was graduated in July, 1822, with the degree of Bachelor of Arts. Apparently, his father's name was Lawrence I. Van Kleek, but no date of birth is given.

However, a book called "Eight Memorial Sermons" by Abraham Messler (Union 1821) says that on his tembstone in Bayside Cemetery, at Communipaw, is inscribed: "To the memory of Rev. Richard D. Van Kleck, born October 30th, 1804, and died May 27th, 1870."

The New Brunswick Theological Seminary Catalogue says "Born, 1800(?)"

As you probably know, he was licensed by the classis of New Brunswick in 1825, and was pastor at Somerville, N.J; Canajoharie, Berne, and Beaverdam, N.T. Besides, he taught at Basking Ridge Academy, Brasmus Hall, and Grasmar School, Jersey City; and died in 1870.

Can you tell us whether he the degree of D. D., and if so, where it was given? Also, we should like to know the names of his wife and children, and the date of his marriage. These personal matters are lacking from our records.

From October, 1821, until January, 1826, more than four years, the church remained vacant. On the 25th of that month, the candidate, Richard D. Van Kleck, was conducted from New-Brunswick by two of the elders, and welcomed to Somerville, after having accepted the call. He continued to serve the church after his ordination, until the 5th day of August, 1831, when, on account of ill-health,

he resigned his charge.

He was a native of Poughkeepsie; graduated at Union College with honor in the class of 1822. In the autumn of the same year, having been a convert in the revival in the college in the winter of 1819 and 1820, he entered the Theological Seminary at New-Brunswick, and was licensed by the classis of New-Brunswick in May, 1825. It was probably not wise in the congregation to call a young man, nor prudent in him to accept their call. The duties of so large a charge proved to be so exhausting, that his health soon began to suffer; and, not too soon to save a little remaining strength, he laid down the onerous burden. He had, and left behind him, many warm friends; but none of them could say that he had not done wisely. He went to Basking Ridge and taught the academy, left vacant by the removal of Dr. Brownlee to a professorship in Rutgers College. In 1834, he assumed the pastorship of the church at Canajoharie, in the valley of the Mohawk. The next year he served the churches of Berne and Beaverdam, in the county of Albany. In 1843, he became principal of Erasmus Hall Academy, in the village of Flatbush, Long Island. In 1860, he went to Jersey City and taught a private classical school, and closed his life there May 27th, 1870.

Mr. Van Kleck was an accurate classical scholar, a man of literary culture, a good preacher, a gentleman; and in social life, genial, confiding and agreeable. He had made made many friends, and died generally lamented. He married, soon after his settlement at Somerville, Sarah Johanna Mellison, of New-Brunswick. One of their daughters became the wife of Rev. Mr. MacNair. The widow resides in Jersey City. His remains were interred in Bayside Cemetery, at Communipaw, Bergen County, and on his tomb is inscribed: "To the memory of Rev. Richard D. Van Kleck, born October 30th, 1804, and died May 27th, 1870. Blessed are the dead which died in the Lord. Yea, saith the Spirit, that they may reat from their labors,

and their works do follow them."
