B. B. WESTFALL

Was called and settled as pastor in 1838. (The Reformed Protestant Dutch Church of Stone Arabia) Under his ministrations the congregation was blessed with a copius revival, over forty persons uniting with the church, on confession, at one time. The church building was also repaired and a new bell procured for it, the whole costing \$2,000. Rev. Mr. Westfall died here, April 6th, 1844, aged 46 years, and was buried under the church. A tablet to his memory is placed in the wall over the pulpit.
