

1834 MONTGOMERY SCHUYLER

FROM: A Letter to Judge James R. Doolittle,  
former classmate of Schuyler at Geneva.  
Dated Union College, May 15, 1834.

"I would not go back to Geneva for any consideration. It has been the making of me coming here. Here you can feel yourself a man and act in accordance with your feelings. If you have talents and possess generous sentiments your society will be courted. Your resources are drawn out and as old Prex says, "College is a world in miniature in which you may learn how to mould your conduct when you go out into the world." We have a paper in opposition to the Parthenon and should you feel a disposition to write something for it we will receive it gladly. I wish you would conclude to take it. You may have the back numbers or commence the year with the next number. Try and see if you can get anyone in college to take it. It is only \$1 a year. Geer, Dick, Taber and Platt are all well pleased with old Union and only regret, as we all do, that we did not come before. Taber wishes you to send on his papers if you will. They all send their respects. Tell Bates and Smith I shall write to them very soon, and believe me as ever

Rev. Dr. Montgomery Schuyler, dean of Christ Church of St. Louis, died March 18. Dr. Schuyler was born in New York City in 1814, and graduated from Union in the class of 1834. He studied law and engaged in business for several years, but then entered the University of the Episcopal church. Dr. Schuyler had been for 38 years president of the standing committee of the diocese of Missouri

MONTGOMERY SCHUYLER, '34, was born in New York city, January 9, 1814. In college he was a Philomathean and a Kappa Alpha. He studied law, but did not practice; went to Michigan in 1835, engaged in mercantile pursuits for a time, and was very successful; studied for the Episcopal ministry, was deacon-in-charge of Trinity Church, Marshall, Mich.; rector at Lyons, N. Y., and Buffalo, N. Y., St. John's Church being organized and built during his rectorship. He left Buffalo in 1854 for Christ Church, St. Louis, the oldest Episcopal church in Missouri. In '86 he became dean of the cathedral. He was chaplain of St. Luke's Hospital, chaplain appointed by President Lincoln during the war, president of standing committee of the diocese of Missouri since 1858. He represented the diocese at ten general conventions. To commemorate his ordination his parishoners erected a large building bearing his name. His character and career were marked by quite exceptional devotion to his sacred calling. He received D. D. from Hobart College in 1856. He was a whig in former days afterward a democrat; a strong union man during the war. Died at St. Louis, March 19, 1896, of bronchial pneumonia; leaving a widow and nine children.

MONTGOMERY SCHUYLER

Montgomery Schuyler, clergyman, was born in New York, Jan. 9, 1814; descended from Arent Schuyler, son of the colonist, Philip, and brother of the first mayor of Albany. He was graduated at Union College in 1834, spent a few years in legal studies and in business, turned to the Episcopal ministry, and has been rector at Marshall, Mich., 1841-44; Lyons N. Y., 1844-5; Buffalo, 1845-54; and since 1854 of Christ Church, St. Louis Mo. He has been president of the standing committee of his diocese since 1858, and of its conventions in the absence of a bishop, and has frequently been a delegate to the general convention. He received the degree of D. D. from Hobart College in 1856, and has published "The Church, its Ministry and Worship" (1853); "The Pioneer Church" (1867), and sundry sermons.

## 1834 MONTGOMERY SCHUYLER

The Rev. Dr. Montgomery Schuyler, son of Anthony Dey and Sarah (Ridge) Schuyler, was born at New York City, January 9, 1814, died at St. Louis, Missouri, in 1896. He entered Geneva (now Hobart) College in 1830, leaving at the end of his junior year, and was graduated at Union in 1834. After some years spent in the practice of law he entered the Protestant Episcopal ministry. He was dean of Christ Church Cathedral in St. Louis for more than ~~thirty years~~ forty years and made many valuable contributions to ecclesiastical literature. He married (first) Sarah Sandford; (second) October 10, 1843, Lydia Eliza Roosevelt, daughter of Nicholas I. Roosevelt; (third) Sophia Elizabeth Norton.

Children: 1. Montgomery Schuyler, born at Skaneateles, N. Y., February 18, 1848.

2. Rev. Louis Sandford, who died a martyr to yellow fever while ministering to the sufferers from the epidemic at Memphis, Tennessee, in 1878.
