CHARLES C. SMITH, '35,

was born near Utica, N. Y., Sept. 8, 1812. He delivered the Latin oration at Commencement. He settled at Chicago, Ill., in legal practice and moved to Tennessee about 1840. In the war with Mexico he served as Lieutenant in the 1st Tennessee Cavalry and on Gen. Taylor's staff and took part in the attack on Vera Cruz. He then settled at Rutledge, East Tennessee, where he held for thirty-one years the first clerkship and mastership of the Court of Chancery. Through the Civil War, he was a fearless and prominent Union man and a co-worker with Parson Brownlow. He was a Whig and a Republican and independent in religious views. He was an invalid for several years, suffering much from kldney disease but awaiting death without fear. He died at Rutledge, November 12, 1898; leaving a widow and four children.
